8	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
9	hereby enacts as follows:
10	Section 1. Article XX-A of the act of March 10, 1949
11	(P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public School Code of 1949, is
12	repealed:
13	[ARTICLE XX-A.
14	THE STATE SYSTEM OF HIGHER EDUCATION.
15	Section 2001-A. DefinitionsThe following words and
16	phrases when used in this article shall, for the purpose of this
17	article, have the following meanings, respectively, except in
18	those instances where the context clearly indicates a different
19	meaning:
20	(1) "Board" shall mean the Board of Governors of the State

System of Higher Education.

2	(2) "Chancellor" shall mean the chief executive officer of
3	the State System of Higher Education.
4	(3) "Coalition bargaining" shall mean two (2) or more
5	employers bargaining jointly with all of their employes in a
6	particular category or bargaining unit so that one collective
7	process would determine the conditions of employment for all
8	employers in the appropriate units involved.
9	(4) "Commission" shall mean the presidents of the several
10	institutions.
11	(5) "Council" shall mean the council of trustees of the
12	individual institutions.
13	(6) "Deferment" shall mean any authorized delay in the
14	payment by a student of all or part of his tuition fee, charges
15	for room and board, application fee, student activity fee, or
16	any other charge or fee.
17	(7) "Employer" shall mean the Board of Governors of the
18	State System of Higher Education as the successor employer to
19	the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
20	(8) "Graduate assistant" means a graduate student appointed
21	by the president and assigned to a faculty or staff member to
22	assist in research, instruction and other related professional
23	duties.
24	(9) "Higher education" shall include any organized program
25	of instruction, research or service primarily concerned with a
26	field of organized knowledge, related theory, and associated
27	practice or application of skills and which leads to a degree;
28	that is, the work is creditable toward a degree.
29	(10) "Institution" shall mean each of the State-owned
30	colleges and university on the effective date hereof, or
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1 hereafter created, and including its personnel, and it	s physical
2 plant, instructional equipment, records and all other p	property
3 thereof.	
4 (11) "Professional employe" for the purposes of th	is act,
5 professional employe means any employe whose work:	
6 (i) is predominately intellectual and varied in ch	aracter;
7 (ii) requires consistent exercise of discretion and	d

15 (12) "Refund" shall mean any return payment, or ret	mission,
16 by an institution to a student of all or part of any s	um he has
17 paid for tuition, room and board, application or stude	nt
18 activity fee or any other charge or fee.	
19 (13) "Secretary" shall mean the Secretary of Educa	tion of
20 the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania or such person as the	secretary
21 may designate to act on behalf of the secretary with re	egard to
22 any of the duties and prerogatives imposed by this act	
23 (14) "State board" shall mean the State Board of E	ducation.
24 (15) "Student" shall mean a person who is enrolled	.in a
25 course of study in any institution which is subject to	the
26 provisions hereof.	
27 (16) "Student association" shall mean the official	ly
28 recognized representative body of the student population	on of each

30 (17) "System" shall mean the State System of Highe	r
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1 Education.

"Waiver" shall mean any release from initial payment by 2 (18)a student of all or part of his tuition, charge for room and 3 board, application or student activity fee or any other charge 4 or fee. 5 6 "Maintenance projects" shall mean those activities, (19)7 materials, labor and contracts necessary to replace, restore, 8 refurbish or enhance real property which do not alter the 9 architectural or engineering characteristics of the structure, 10 as follows: painting; window repair and replacement; roof repair and replacement; repointing and masonry repair; downspout and 11 gutters; landscaping; roadways, parking facilities, track and 12 13 athletic court resurfacing and reconstruction; sidewalk and 14 curbing reconstruction and replacement; asbestos abatement (in accordance with all State and Federal statutes and regulations); 15 16 caulking and insulation; and replacement, reconstruction and construction of non-load bearing interior walls. No such project 17 18 shall affect the structural integrity of any existing facility 19 or utility system. 20 "Campus police" shall mean all law enforcement (20)personnel employed by the system who have successfully completed 21 a campus police course of training approved under 53 Pa.C.S. Ch. 22 23 21 Subch. D (relating to municipal police education and 24 training). "Grounds" shall mean all lands and buildings owned, 25 (21)controlled, leased or managed by the system and all highways, 26 27 trafficways and bicycle and pedestrian facilities that traverse 28 or abut such lands and buildings. 29 Section 2002-A. Establishment of the State System of Higher Education and its Institutions.--(a) Subject to the regulatory 30

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1 powers conferred by law upon the State Board of Education, there
2 is hereby established a body corporate and politic constituting
3 a public corporation and government instrumentality which shall
4 be known as the State System of Higher Education, independent of
5 the Department of Education, hereinafter referred to as the
6 system, which shall consist of the following institutions and
7 such other institutions, presently existing or newly created, as
8 may hereafter be admitted by the board in concurrence with other
9 agencies as required by law:
10 (1) Bloomsburg State College;
11 (2) California State College;
12 (3) Cheyney State College;
13 (4) Clarion State College;
14 (5) East Stroudsburg State College;
15 (6) Edinboro State College;
16 (7) Indiana University of Pennsylvania;
17 (8) Kutztown State College;
18 (9) Lock Haven State College;
19 (10) Mansfield State College;
20 (11) Millersville State College;
21 (12) Shippensburg State College;
22 (13) Slippery Rock State College; and
23 (14) West Chester State College.
24 (b) Each of the said institutions shall hereafter be known
25 as the (Name) University of Pennsylvania of the State System of
26 Higher Education, except for Indiana University of Pennsylvania,
27 which shall retain its name. As successor institutions to the
28 State Normal Schools, appropriations for their operation are
29 ordinary expenses of government, requiring only a majority vote
30 of each House of the General Assembly. The State System of
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Higher Education shall have the same preferred status for 1 2 appropriations as is enjoyed by its constituent institutions. 3 State funds appropriated to the system shall be allocated to the individual institutions on a formula based on, but not limited 4 to, such factors as enrollments, degrees granted and programs. 5 6 Section 2003-A. Purposes and General Powers.--(a) The State 7 System of Higher Education shall be part of the Commonwealth's 8 system of higher education. Its purpose shall be to provide high quality education at the lowest possible cost to the students. 9 10 The primary mission of the system is the provision of instruction for undergraduate and graduate students to and 11 beyond the master's degree in the liberal arts and sciences and 12 13 in applied fields, including the teaching profession. Graduate 14 instruction at the doctoral level, except for doctoral programs provided for in the act of December 16, 1965 (P.L.1113, No.430), 15 16 known as the "Indiana University of Pennsylvania Act," only may be offered jointly with Indiana University or an institution 17 18 chartered to offer work at the doctoral level. Programs of 19 research and service may be provided which are approved by the Board of Governors, and which are consistent with the primary 20 mission of the system. Each institution shall provide 21 appropriate educational facilities, student living facilities 22 23 and such other facilities as deemed necessary by the board. 24 (b) The system is hereby granted and shall have and may 25 exercise all the powers necessary or convenient for the carrying out of the aforesaid purposes, including, but without limiting 26 the generality of the foregoing, the following rights and 27 28 powers: 29 (1) To have perpetual existence as a corporation. 30 (2) To adopt, use and alter at will a corporate seal.

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1 (3) To acquire, purchase, hold, lease as lessee and use any 2 property, real, personal or mixed, tangible or intangible, or 3 any interest therein, lease as lessor any property, real, personal or mixed, tangible or intangible, necessary or 4 desirable for carrying out the purposes of the system, and to 5 sell, transfer and dispose of any property acquired by gift, 6 7 grant, devise or bequest, whether the property is real, personal 8 or mixed, tangible or intangible, or any interest therein; to take, demand, receive and possess all moneys, real property and 9 goods which shall be appropriated, given or granted to for the 10 use of the system and to apply the same according to the will of 11 the donors; to sell, transfer and dispose of real property 12 13 acquired by and titled to the system upon approval by the 14 General Assembly as provided in section 2018-A; and by gift, purchase or devise to receive, possess, enjoy and retain forever 15 16 any and all real and personal estate and funds, of whatsoever kind, nature or quality the same may be, in special trust and 17 18 confidence that the same, and the profits thereof, shall be 19 applied to and for the use and purpose of endowing the system, 20 and shall have power to receive donations from any source whatever, to be exclusively devoted to the purposes of the 21 system or according to the terms of donation: Provided, however, 22 23 That the system shall have no power at any time or in any 24 manner, to pledge the credit or taxing power of the 25 Commonwealth, nor shall any of its obligations or debts be 26 deemed to be obligations of the Commonwealth, nor shall the Commonwealth be liable for the payment of principal or interest 27 on such obligations. Nothing herein shall empower the Board of 28 29 Governors or the chancellor to take or receive any moneys, goods or other property, real or personal, which is given or granted 30

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1 to specific institutions.

Collective bargaining agreements in force at the time of 2 (C) enactment of this act shall remain in force for the term of the 3 contract. New collective bargaining agreements with professional 4 employes shall be negotiated on behalf of the system by the 5 6 chancellor. The board shall make a coalition bargaining 7 arrangement with the Commonwealth for the negotiation of new 8 collective bargaining agreements with noninstructional employes. 9 (d) The system may enter into an agreement with any entity 10 for the cooperative use of supplies or services. All purchases and agreements made pursuant to this subsection shall be the 11 result of a system of competitive bidding and in accordance with 12 13 the laws of this Commonwealth. 14 Section 2004-A. Board of Governors.--(a) The system shall be governed and all of its corporate powers exercised by the 15 16 Board of Governors, which shall consist of twenty (20) members to be appointed as follows: 17 18 (1)The Governor, or his designee. 19 (2) The Secretary of Education, or his designee. 20 One (1) Senator appointed by the President pro tempore (3) of the Senate. 21 (4) One (1) Senator appointed by the Minority Leader of the 22 23 Senate. 24 One (1) Representative appointed by the Speaker of the (5) House of Representatives. 25 26 One (1) Representative appointed by the Minority Leader (6) of the House of Representatives. 27 Fourteen (14) members shall be appointed by the Governor 28 (7) 29 with the advice and consent of the Senate of which six (6) shall be selected from the citizens of the Commonwealth. Three (3) 30

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members of the fourteen (14) shall be students whose terms shall 1 2 expire upon graduation, separation or failure to maintain good 3 academic standards at their institution and five (5) of the fourteen (14) shall be trustees of constituent institutions, 4 however, no more than one trustee representing a constituent 5 institution. The student members shall be selected from the 6 7 presidents of the local campus student government associations, 8 or their local equivalent. 9 (b) All members of the board appointed by the Governor, except for the students, shall serve for terms of four (4) 10 years. The Governor and Secretary of Education shall serve so 11 long as they continue in office. Members of the board appointed 12 from the General Assembly shall serve a term of office 13 14 concurrent with their respective elective terms as members of the General Assembly. 15 16 (c) (1) The Governor or his designee, and the Secretary of Education or his designee, and the members of the General 17 18 Assembly shall be members of the board and shall be entitled to 19 attend all meetings of the board and shall have the right to 20 speak on all matters before the board, and to vote, but shall not be elected as an officer of the board. 21 (2) A member of the General Assembly appointed under 22 23 subsection (a) may designate an official representative to 24 attend any meetings of the board, the executive committee of the board and any committee to which the member of the General 25 Assembly is assigned. Such official representative shall have 26 27 the right to speak on all matters before the board, the 28 executive committee and any committee to which the member of the 29 General Assembly is assigned but shall not have the right to 30 vote on behalf of the member of the General Assembly.

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1 The board shall elect one (1) of its members to serve as (d) 2 its chairperson at the pleasure of the board. Members shall 3 receive no compensation for their services but shall be reimbursed for the expenses necessarily incurred by them in the 4 performance of their duties. The board shall meet quarterly and 5 additionally at the call of the chairperson, or upon request of 6 7 six (6) members of the board. The chancellor shall be the chief executive officer of 8 (e) 9 the board and shall have the right to speak on all matters before the board, but not to vote. 10 Section 2005-A. The Chancellor. -- The chief executive officer 11 of the system shall be a chancellor, who shall be employed by 12 13 the board in accordance with clause (1) of section 2006-A. In addition to those prescribed by the board, the chancellor shall 14 15 have the following duties: 16 (1) The chancellor shall be responsible for the administration of the system under policies prescribed by the 17 18 board. 19 (2) The chancellor shall advise the board on the formulation 20 of policies, shall see that the board's policies are carried out and shall supervise the board's studies. 21 (3) The chancellor shall recommend to the board the system's 22 23 overall budget and shall review and recommend undergraduate and 24 graduate academic programs to meet the needs of the system's 25 student population. 26 The chancellor shall assist the board in its appointment (4) 27 of the presidents for the constituent institutions by submitting 28 to the board the name or names of individuals recommended by the council of trustees of the appropriate constituent institution 29 who shall involve students, faculty and alumni in the interview 30 20180HB2551PN3857 - 10 -

and selection process used to formulate their recommendation. 1 2 The chancellor shall submit to the board the recommended salary 3 and other proposed terms of each such appointment. The board shall have the right to refuse the recommendation of the local 4 council and to request that additional recommendations be 5 submitted by the council. 6 7 (5) The chancellor shall prepare an evaluation procedure for 8 adoption by the board. The chancellor shall forward the results 9 of the evaluation conducted by the local council of trustees 10 with his comments to the board. The chancellor is empowered to employ central office 11 (6) professional and staff employes appropriate for the efficient 12 13 discharge of the chancellor's duties. 14 (7) The chancellor shall be responsible for the administration of the central office, systemwide business 15 procedures and for the overall organization of maintenance of 16 the physical plants and security at all institutions. 17 18 (8) The chancellor shall conduct comprehensive planning in consultation with representatives of the trustees, presidents, 19 20 faculties, students and alumni and within the policies 21 established by the board to establish priorities and procedures 22 for the operation and development among the institutions, with 23 respect to the role and scope of each institution, instructional 24 programs, research programs and public service programs. 25 The chancellor shall have the right to require of the (9) 26 presidents any and all information necessary for the performance 27 of his duties. The chancellor shall perform such other duties as 28 the board may designate. 29 (10) The chancellor shall serve as an ex officio member of 30 the council of each institution in the system.

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1 (11) The chancellor shall negotiate or cause to be 2 negotiated on behalf of the board and subject to its final 3 approval collective bargaining agreements pursuant to the act of July 23, 1970 (P.L.563, No.195), known as the "Public Employe 4 Relations Act," in accordance with section 2003-A of this act. 5 6 To enter into multiparty contractual relationships, in (12) 7 accordance with the Procurement Code or direct negotiation, with 8 businesses, industries, organizations, State and local 9 governments and the Federal Government to provide economic and 10 work force development. Section 2006-A. Powers and Duties of the Board of 11 Governors.--(a) The Board of Governors shall have overall 12 13 responsibility for planning and coordinating the development and operation of the system. The powers and duties of the Board of 14 Governors shall be: 15 16 (1) To employ the chancellor to serve at the board's pleasure under fixed term or contract of fixed duration of not 17 18 longer than five (5) years; to fix his salary; to prescribe and 19 delineate his duties and responsibilities; prior to the renewal 20 of such term or contract, the board shall conduct an evaluation of the chancellor's service to determine whether such term or 21 22 contract should be renewed and for what period of time. 23 (2) To appoint from the list submitted by the chancellor, 24 pursuant to section 2005-A(4), presidents of the constituent 25 institutions to serve at the board's pleasure under fixed terms or contracts of fixed duration, to fix the salaries and other 26 27 terms of appointment of each president and prior to renewal of 28 such term or contract consider the results of the evaluation of 29 each president's service submitted by the chancellor. 30 (3) To establish policies and procedures to be applied by 20180HB2551PN3857

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the chancellor, the board and each local council in evaluating 1 2 the president and recommending the selection, retention and 3 dismissal of the president of its respective institution. To establish broad fiscal, personnel and educational 4 (4) policies under which the institutions of the system shall 5 6 operate. 7 (5) To create new undergraduate and graduate degree 8 programs, which shall not be subject to the rules and 9 regulations of the State Board of Education; to approve 10 extension campuses and new external degree programs subject to the rules and regulations of the State Board of Education; to 11 promote cooperation among institutions, including the 12 13 development of consortia within the system and other educational 14 institutions and agencies. (6) To establish general policies for the admission of 15 16 students and to assure procedural protection for the discipline and expulsion of students. The actual admission of students 17 18 shall remain the province of the individual institutions. 19 (7) To coordinate, review, amend and approve the annual 20 capital budget requirements of the system, the annual operating budgets of the individual institutions and the operating budget 21 of the chancellor and the board. The board shall present these 22 23 annual budgets with comments to the secretary for presentation 24 to the State board. The State board shall return such budget 25 requests, recommending approval or disapproval with comments, if 26 any, to the secretary prior to their submission to the Secretary 27 of Budget and Administration. The board may also submit its 28 budget recommendations and findings to the General Assembly 29 subsequent to the submission of the Governor's budget to the 30 General Assembly. 2	(P.L.177, No.175), known as "The Administrative Code of 1929,"
3	except for section 615.
4	(8) To establish general personnel policies under which the
5	institutions shall operate consistent with merit principles; to
6	determine equivalent degree and teaching experience
7	qualifications for appointment or promotion of faculty employes
8	within the classifications enumerated in the act of January 18,
9	1952 (1951 P.L.2111, No.600), referred to as the State College
10	Faculty Compensation Law, to include, but not be limited to, the
11	Degrees of Juris Doctor and Master of Fine Arts; and to enter
12	into collective bargaining agreements pursuant to the act of
13	July 23, 1970 (P.L.563, No.195), known as the "Public Employe
14	Relations Act," in accordance with section 2003-A of this act.
15	(9) To recommend approval or disapproval of all system
16	building projects to the Secretary of the Budget which are not
17	within the contracting authority of the system under section
18	2003-A.1.
19	(10) To represent the system before the General Assembly,
20	the Governor and the State board.
21	(11) To fix the levels of tuition fees, except student
22	activity fees. Tuition fees shall include a differential for
23	such charges between students who are residents of the
24	Commonwealth and students who are nonresidents.
25	(12) To adopt general policies with regard to student
26	activity fees and to provide for student participation in the
27	formulation of these policies.
28	(13) To establish policies regarding waiver, deferment and
29	refund of tuition fees and other charges and fees.
30	(13.1) To set the amounts for fines for violations of rules

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respecting the use, parking and operation of motor vehicles on 1 2 system facilities, which may be established to exceed the 3 amounts which municipalities are authorized to assess for such offenses under 75 Pa.C.S. (relating to vehicles). 4 To make all reasonable rules and regulations necessary 5 (14)6 to carry out the purposes of this article and the duties of the 7 board. To do and perform generally all of those things 8 (15)9 necessary and required to accomplish the role and objectives of 10 the system. 11 The Board of Governors shall provide for the holding of (b) regular and special meetings. Eleven (11) governors attending 12 13 shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business and, unless a greater number is required by the bylaws of the 14 15 board, the act of a majority of the governors present at any 16 meeting shall be deemed the act of the board. 17 Section 2007-A. Commission of Presidents.--The commission of 18 presidents of the system shall consist of the presidents of the 19 several institutions who shall annually select one (1) of their 20 members as chairperson. The commission shall recommend policies for the institutions and shall act in an advisory capacity to 21 the chancellor and the governors. The commission shall meet 22 23 quarterly and additionally at the call of its chairperson or the 24 chancellor. A majority of the presidents shall constitute a 25 quorum. 26 Section 2008-A. Councils of Trustees.--(a) The council of each of the institutions shall consist of eleven (11) members 27 who, except for student members, shall be nominated and 28 29 appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. At least two (2) members of the eleven (11) member 30 20180HB2551PN3857

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1 council of trustees shall be alumni of the institution. 2 (b) Ten (10) members of each council shall serve terms of 3 six (6) years, respectively, and until their respective successors are duly appointed and qualified. One (1) member of 4 each council shall be a full-time undergraduate student in good 5 academic standing, other than freshman, enrolled for at least 6 7 twelve (12) semester hours at the institution of which he is a 8 trustee. The student member shall serve a term of four (4) years 9 or for so long as he is a full-time undergraduate student in 10 attendance at the institution of which he is a trustee, whichever period is shorter, and is in good academic standing. 11 Vacancies occurring before the expiration of the term of any 12 13 member shall be filled in like manner for the unexpired term. 14 Student members of the Council of Trustees shall be appointed by the Governor and shall not be subject to Senate confirmation. If 15 16 a student member is temporarily unable, for medical or valid academic reasons, to fulfill the responsibilities of office, the 17 18 Council of Trustees may request that the Governor appoint an 19 otherwise qualified student to serve as an alternate until the 20 return of the student member. 21 (c) The members of each board of trustees of a former State college or university serving in such capacity on the effective 22 23 date of this act shall continue to serve for the balance of 24 their respective terms. 25 (d) Six (6) members of a council shall constitute a quorum. Each council shall select from its members a chairperson and a 26 27 secretary to serve at the pleasure of the council. Each council 28 shall meet at least quarterly, and additionally at the call of 29 the president, or its chairperson, or upon request of three (3) of its members. 30

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1 Section 2009-A. Powers and Duties of Councils of Trustees.--2 In accordance with the rules and regulations adopted by the 3 board, the council of each institution shall have the power and its duty shall be: 4 5 (1) To make recommendations to the chancellor for the 6 appointment, retention or dismissal of the president following 7 consultation with students, faculty and alumni. 8 (2)To assist the president in developing proper relations 9 and understanding between the institution and its programs and 10 the public, in order to serve the interests and needs of both. 11 (3) To review and approve the recommendations of the president as to standards for the admission, discipline and 12 13 expulsion of students. 14 (4) To review and approve the recommendations of the 15 president pertaining to policies and procedures governing the use of institutional facilities and property. 16 (5) To approve schools and academic programs. 17 18 (6) To review and approve the recommendations of the president pertaining to annual operating and capital budget 19 20 requirements for forwarding to the board. 21 To review and approve charges for room and board and (7) 22 other fees except student activity fees. 23 (8) To conduct an annual physical inspection of facilities 24 and make recommendations regarding maintenance and construction 25 to the board. 26 (9) To review and approve all contracts and purchases negotiated or awarded by the president with or without 27 28 competitive bidding and all contracts for consultative services 29 entered by the president. 30 To represent the institution at official functions of (10)

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the Commonwealth. 1

2	(11) To take such other action as may be necessary to
3	effectuate the powers and duties herein delegated.
4	(12) In accordance with the evaluation procedure established
5	by the board each council shall conduct an evaluation of the
6	president and forward the results of that evaluation with
7	recommendation to the chancellor for submission to the board.
8	(13) By resolution adopted by the council to authorize
9	campus police who have completed firearms training in accordance
10	with 53 Pa.C.S. § 2167(a) (relating to police training) to carry
11	firearms in the course of duty for any institution whose campus
12	police are authorized to carry firearms on the effective date of
13	this paragraph, the authority to carry firearms shall remain in
14	effect unless the council by resolution dissolves such
15	authority.
16	Section 2010-A. Power and Duties of Institution
17	PresidentsThe president of each institution shall be
18	appointed by the board. The president shall be the chief
19	executive officer of that institution. He shall have the right
20	to attend all meetings of the council of that institution and
21	shall have the right to speak on all matters before the council
22	but not to vote. Subject to the stated authority of the board
23	and the council, each president shall have the following powers
24	and duties:
25	(1) Except insofar as such matters are governed by
26	collective bargaining agreements entered pursuant to the act of
27	July 23, 1970 (P.L.563, No.195), known as the "Public Employe
28	Relations Act," and subject to the policies of the board, to
29	appoint such employes, professional and noninstructional,

24	Section 2011-A. Rental Fees and Other Charges(a) In
25	addition to rental fees fixed, charged and collected in the

29	fixed by the president, with approval of the Council of

27	submitted as part of the board's executive budget request.
28	(4) Beginning in the 2019-2020 fiscal year and annually
29	thereafter, the board shall require a member institution
30	prior to registration to provide each enrolled student

1	electronic access to the economic security report of
2	employment and earning outcomes prepared by the Department of
3	Education. In addition, the board shall require a member
4	institution to provide each student electronic access to the
5	following information each year prior to registration:
6	(i) The top 25% of degrees reported by the member
7	institution in terms of highest full-time job placement
8	and highest average annualized earnings in the year after
9	earning the degree.
10	(ii) The bottom 10% of degrees reported by the
11	<u>member institutions in terms of lowest full-time job</u>
12	placement and lowest average annualized earnings in the
13	year after earning the degree.
14	(5) The board shall maintain an effective information
15	system to provide accurate, timely and cost-effective
16	information about each member institution. The board shall
17	continue to collect and maintain, at a minimum, management
18	information as such information existed on June 30, 2019.
19	(6) If the board determines that a member institution's
20	trustees are unwilling or unable to address substantiated
21	allegations made by a person relating to waste, fraud or
22	financial mismanagement within the member institution, the
23	Office of Inspector General shall investigate the
24	allegations.
25	(7) The board may request authority from the General
26	Assembly to waive or modify specific statutory requirements
27	in order to reduce barriers and support the attainment of
28	goals identified in member institutions' plans, as necessary
29	for advancing system priorities and unique member institution
30	priorities. Regulatory flexibilities authorized and statutory
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1	flexibilities authorized or requested by the board under this
2	subsection must be included in the accountability plan
3	prepared and submitted under paragraph (3).
4	(8) The board, or the board's designee, shall develop
5	guidelines and procedures related to data and technology,
6	including information systems, communications systems,
7	computer hardware and software and networks.
8	(9) The board shall develop guidelines for supervising
9	faculty practice plans for academic health science centers.
10	(10) The board shall prescribe conditions for direct-
11	support system health services support organizations to be
12	certified and to use member institution property and
13	services. Conditions relating to certification must provide
14	for audit review and oversight by the board.
15	(11) The board shall ensure that students at member_
16	institutions have access to general education courses as
17	provided in the Statewide articulation agreement, pursuant to
18	section 2012-A.1.
19	(12) The board shall approve baccalaureate degree
20	programs that require more than 120 semester credit hours of
21	coursework prior to the programs being offered by a member
22	institution. At least half of the required coursework for any
23	baccalaureate degree must be offered at the lower-division
24	level, except in program areas approved by the board.
25	(13) The board, or the board's designee, shall adopt a
26	written antihazing policy, appropriate penalties for
27	violations of the policy and a program for enforcing the
28	policy.
29	(14) The board, or the board's designee, may establish a
30	uniform code of conduct and appropriate penalties for
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1	violations of regulations by students and student
2	organizations, including regulations governing student
3	academic honesty. The penalties, unless otherwise provided by
4	law, may include reasonable fines, the withholding of
5	diplomas or transcripts pending compliance with regulations
6	or payment of fines and the imposition of probation,
7	<u>suspension or dismissal.</u>
8	(15) The board shall adopt regulations requiring member
9	institutions to use purchasing agreements or State-term
10	contracts under 62 Pa.C.S. (relating to procurement) or enter
11	into consortia and cooperative agreements to maximize the
12	purchasing power for goods and services. A consortium or
13	cooperative agreement may be Statewide, regional or a
14	combination of institutions, as appropriate to achieve the
15	lowest cost, with the goal of achieving a 5% savings on
16	existing contract prices through the use of new cooperative
17	arrangements or new consortium contracts.
18	Section 2005-A.1. Member institution council of trustees.
19	(a) Council of trusteesEach member institution shall be
20	administered by a council of trustees comprised of nine members
21	<u>as follows:</u>
22	(1) one faculty member of the member institution
23	selected by the faculty member's peers;
24	(2) the president of the student body of the member
25	institutions;
26	(3) four citizen members appointed by the Governor; and
27	(4) three citizen members appointed by the Board of
28	<u>Governors.</u>
29	(b) Powers and structureThe following apply:
30	(1) Each member institution council of trustees shall be

1	a public body corporate by the name of "The (name of member
2	institution) Council of Trustees," with all the powers of a
3	body corporate, including the power to adopt a corporate
4	seal, to contract and be contracted with, to sue and be sued,
5	to plead and be impleaded in all courts of law or equity, and
6	to give and receive donations. In all suits against a council
7	of trustees, service of process shall be made on the chair of
8	the council of trustees or, in the absence of the chair, on
9	the corporate secretary or designee.
10	(2) The corporation shall be constituted as a public
11	instrumentality, and the exercise by the corporation of the
12	power conferred by this section shall be considered to be the
13	performance of an essential public function and shall be
14	entitled to provide notice of internal review committee
15	meetings for competitive proposals or procurement to
16	applicants by mail or facsimile rather than by means of
17	publication.
18	(3) Each council of trustees shall constitute the
19	contracting agent of the member institution.
20	(c) TermsTrustees appointed under this section shall
21	serve staggered five-year terms. For initial appointments under
22	subsection (a)(3), beginning July 1, 2019, three members shall
23	serve two-year terms, three members shall serve three-year terms
24	and three members shall serve five-year terms. There shall be no
25	State residency requirement for council members, but the
26	Governor and the Board of Governors shall consider diversity and
27	regional representation.
28	(d) CompensationTrustees shall receive no compensation
29	but may be reimbursed for travel and per diem expenses.
30	(e) Chair and vice chairThe following apply:

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1	(1) Each council of trustees shall select a chair and
2	vice chair from the appointed trustees.
3	(2) (i) Except as provided under subparagraph (ii),
4	each chair shall serve for two years and may be
5	reselected for one additional consecutive two-year term.
6	(ii) For each additional consecutive term beyond the
7	two terms provided for under subparagraph (i), a council
8	of trustees may, by a two-thirds votes, reselect the
9	chair for an additional consecutive two-year term.
10	(3) The chair:
11	(i) shall preside at all meetings of the council of
12	trustees;
13	(ii) may call special meetings of the council of
14	<u>trustees;</u>
15	(iii) attest to actions of the trustees; and
16	(iv) notify the board in writing when a trustee has
17	three consecutive unexcused absences from regular board
18	meetings in any fiscal year, which may be grounds for
19	removal by the Board of Governors.
20	(f) Meeting minutesEach council of trustees shall keep
21	and, within two weeks after a board meeting, post prominently on
22	the member institution's publicly accessible Internet website,
23	detailed meeting minutes for all meetings, including the vote
24	history and attendance of each trustee. The board shall adopt
25	regulations to provide for the implementation of this
26	subsection.
27	(g) Rental fees and other chargesThe following apply:
28	(1) In addition to rental fees fixed, charged and
29	collected in the manner provided by law from each student
30	residing in State-owned or State-leased residential
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1	facilities at a member institution for the maintenance and
2	operation of such facilities, a sum shall be fixed by the
3	council of trustees, with approval of the board, and charged
4	and collected from each person as an additional rental fee.
5	Additional rental fees shall be credited to a reserve fund
6	for contingencies and capital replacements.
7	(2) In addition to the other fees from time to time
8	fixed, charged and collected in the manner provided by law, a
9	fee of \$10 per semester of 18 weeks and a proportionate fee
10	for each trimester, quarter, term and summer session of six
11	weeks or three weeks shall be fixed, charged and collected
12	from each student while in attendance at a member
13	institution.
14	Section 2006-A.1. Diplomas and certificates.
15	The board shall prescribe minimum standards for graduation
16	from the system. Each graduate shall receive a diploma as the
17	board prescribes. The system shall be authorized to grant
18	baccalaureate, master's and doctoral degrees as limited by
19	section 2004-A.1 for successful completion of prescribed courses
20	of study and such other certificates and degrees as the board
21	<u>may authorize.</u>
22	Section 2007-A.1. Teachers' and employees' retirement plans.
23	<u>Under the provisions of 24 Pa.C.S. § 8301 (relating to</u>
24	mandatory and optional membership in the system and
25	participation in the plan), all professional and other employees
26	of the system and its member institutions shall be accorded the
27	right to elect participation in the Pennsylvania Public School
28	Employees' Retirement System or the State Employees' Retirement
29	System. Alternatively, eligible employees shall have the right
30	to elect participation in the Teachers' Insurance and Annuity
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1	Association of AmericaCollege Retirement Equities Fund
2	<u>retirement plan or in an alternative retirement plan or plans</u>
3	offered by an insurance company authorized to issue annuity
4	contracts in this Commonwealth or a mutual fund company with
5	investment options meeting the requirements of a qualified plan
6	under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (Public Law 99-514, 26
7	<u>U.S.C. § 1 et seq.). The alternative retirement plans shall be</u>
8	selected by the system pursuant to the request-for-proposal
9	process.
10	Section 2008-A.1. Nondiscrimination.
11	No person shall be denied matriculation at a member
12	institution or a position on the board, as a trustee, faculty
13	member or employee of the system, or the opportunity to contract
14	with the system or its member institutions because of race,
15	<u>color, religion, age, sex, national origin, handicap or</u>
16	political affiliation. The board shall develop and promulgate by
17	regulation a plan assuring equal opportunity in educational
18	access, employment and contracting. The plan shall provide for
19	nondiscrimination and compliance with respect to contracting
20	practices for the system, its constituent institutions and the
21	contractors, subcontractors, assignees, lessees, agents, vendors
22	and suppliers of the institutions.
23	Section 2009-A.1. Annual audit.
24	(a) AuditThe activities of the system, including member
25	institutions, under this article are subject to the audit of the
26	Department of the Auditor General, but the system, including
27	member institutions, shall not be required to pay a fee for an
28	audit. The Auditor General shall make an annual report to the
29	board and to the General Assembly showing its condition at the
30	end of the Commonwealth's fiscal year.
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1	(b) Financial statements requiredThe Auditor General
2	shall report the financial statements of the system in
3	accordance with generally accepted accounting principles as
4	prescribed by the National Association of College and University
5	Business Officers, the American Institute of Certified Public
6	Accountants or any other recognized authoritative body, as well
7	as applicable policy and standards promulgated by the Federal
8	Government and the Commonwealth. An annual report shall be
9	submitted in electronic format by the Auditor General to the
10	President pro tempore of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of
11	Representatives, the Majority Leader and Minority Leader of the
12	Senate, the Majority Leader and Minority Leader of the House of
13	Representatives, the Appropriations Committee of the Senate, the
14	Appropriations Committee of the House of Representatives, the
15	Education Committee of the Senate and the Education Committee of
16	the House of Representatives. Each report, to be submitted prior
17	to September 1, shall cover the 12-month period beginning with
18	the summer term of the preceding year and shall include:
19	(1) The following counts and distributions for each term
20	during the period:
21	(i) The job titles and descriptions and numbers of
22	faculty members employed full time, faculty members
23	employed part time, full-time students enrolled in
24	graduate courses, full-time students enrolled in
25	<u>undergraduate courses, part-time students enrolled in</u>
26	graduate courses and part-time students enrolled in
27	<u>undergraduate courses.</u>
28	(ii) The total numbers of undergraduate student
29	credit hours, divided into lower division and upper
30	division course levels and of graduate student credit

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1	hours divided into three course levels, master's, first
2	professional and doctoral.
3	(iii) The number of different courses scheduled by
4	level of instruction and the number of sections of
5	individual instruction scheduled by level of instruction,
6	each further subdivided by two digit CIP categories of
7	instructional programs of higher education as defined by
8	the National Center for Education Statistics, United
9	States Department of Education.
10	(iv) The number of terms scheduled and the dates
11	thereof.
12	(2) For the summer term and the following academic year
13	in total and for each two digit CIP category, a
14	classification of:
15	(i) faculty members or other professional employees
16	by title, including professor, associate professor,
17	assistant professor, instructor, lecturer, research
18	associate, librarian and academic administrator;
19	(ii) faculty members or other professional employees
20	under each title to be subdivided by the assignment of
21	teaching or nonteaching;
22	(iii) faculty members or other professional
23	employees under each title to be subdivided by full-time
24	or part-time employment status; and
25	(iv) the following aggregates for each subdivided
26	classification:
27	(A) The number of faculty and other professional
28	employees and their full-time equivalence in
29	instructional and noninstructional functions.
30	(B) The sum of credits assigned to undergraduate

1	classroom courses and the sum of credits assigned to
2	graduate classroom courses taught, divided into lower
3	division, upper division, master's, first
4	professional and doctoral course levels.
5	(C) The sum of credits assigned to undergraduate
6	individual instruction courses and the sum of credits
7	assigned to graduate individual instruction courses
8	taught, divided into lower division, upper division,
9	master's, first professional and doctoral course
10	levels.
11	(D) The sum of undergraduate classroom student
12	credit hours and the sum of graduate classroom
13	student credit hours generated, divided into lower
14	<u>division, upper division, master's, first</u>
15	professional and doctoral course levels.
16	(E) The sum of undergraduate individual
17	instruction student credit hours and the sum of
18	graduate individual instruction student credit hours
19	generated, divided into lower division, upper
20	division, master's, first professional and doctoral
21	<u>course levels.</u>
22	(F) The total salary paid for instructional
23	functions and for noninstructional functions, and the
24	amount of the salary paid for each of these functions
25	from Federal money, university money and other money.
26	(3) For each term of the period covered for each faculty
27	member employed full time identified by two digit CIP
28	category and title, the report shall contain an analysis of
29	the average hours per week spent in university-related
30	activities, stating specifically hours spent in undergraduate
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1	classroom contact and graduate classroom contact, hours spent
2	in preparation, hours spent in research and hours spent in
3	public service.
4	(4) Each report under this subsection covering a 12-
5	month period shall include for all programs of the member_
6	institution:
7	(i) The minimum number of credits required for a
8	baccalaureate degree and for a master's degree.
9	(ii) The number of bachelor's degrees, master's
10	degrees, first professional degrees and doctoral degrees
11	awarded in the three previous years and those estimated
12	for that year.
13	(c) Posting requiredEach report submitted under this
14	section shall be posted by the system on the system's publicly
15	accessible Internet website for a period of no less than five
16	years from the date of submission.
17	Section 2010-A.1. Method of disposition and consideration by
18	the General Assembly.
19	(a) Sale, transfer or disposal of real propertyIf the
20	system deems that it is necessary or desirable to sell, transfer
21	or dispose of real property acquired by and titled to it, the
22	board shall request authorization from the General Assembly to
23	sell, transfer or dispose of the real property and shall submit
24	to the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House
25	of Representatives requests to sell, transfer or dispose of real
26	property acquired by and titled to the system for consideration
27	by the General Assembly.
28	(b) Legislative action and calendarThe following apply:
29	(1) Each request for authorization to sell, transfer or
30	dispose of real property transmitted to the General Assembly
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1	shall be proposed as a resolution, shall be placed on the
2	calendar of each house for the next legislative day following
3	its receipt and shall be considered by each house within 30
4	calendar days of continuous session of the General Assembly.
5	(2) A resolution approved under paragraph (1) shall not
6	be effective unless the resolution:
7	(i) designates the number of the request for
8	authorization to sell, transfer or dispose of real
9	property and the date on which it was transmitted to the
10	<u>General Assembly; or</u>
11	(ii) specifies more than one request for
12	authorization to sell, transfer or dispose of real
13	property.
14	(3) Continuity of session shall be considered as broken
15	only by an adjournment of the General Assembly sine die.
16	(4) In the computation of the 30-day period, days on
17	which either house is not in session because of an
18	adjournment of more than 10 days to a day certain shall be
19	<u>excluded.</u>
20	(c) Approval requiredEach request for authorization to
21	sell, transfer or dispose of real property shall only take
22	effect if it is approved by a majority vote of the duly elected
23	membership of each house during the 30-day period.
24	(d) Effective dateThe effective date of each request for
25	authorization to sell, transfer or dispose of real property
26	shall be the date of approval of the last of the two houses to
27	act. Upon the expiration of the 30-day period after the delivery
28	of the request for authorization to sell, transfer or dispose of
29	real property to the two Houses of the General Assembly and the
30	failure to act as provided in subsection (c), each request for
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1	authorization to sell, transfer or dispose of real property
2	shall become effective.
3	Section 2011-A.1. Campus police.
4	(a) Powers and dutiesThe following apply:
5	(1) Campus police of a member institution shall have the
6	power and duty to:
7	(i) enforce good order on the grounds and in the
8	buildings of the member institution;
9	(ii) protect the grounds and buildings of the member
10	institution;
11	(iii) exclude all disorderly persons from the
12	grounds and buildings of the member institution;
13	(iv) adopt means necessary for the performance of
14	<u>their duties;</u>
15	(v) exercise the same powers as are now or may
16	hereafter be exercised under authority of law or
17	ordinance by the police of the municipalities wherein the
18	member institution is located, including, but not limited
19	to, those powers conferred under 42 Pa.C.S. Ch. 89 Subch.
20	D (relating to municipal police jurisdiction);
21	(vi) prevent crime, investigate criminal acts,
22	apprehend, arrest and charge criminal offenders and issue
23	summary citations for acts committed on the grounds of
24	the member institution and carry the criminal offenders
25	before the proper district justice and prefer charges
26	against them under the laws of this Commonwealth;
27	(vii) order off the grounds and out of the buildings
28	of the member institution all trespassers and persons
29	under the influence of alcohol or controlled substances
30	and, if necessary, remove them by force and, in case of

1	resistance, carry that person before the proper district
2	justice and prefer charges against that person under the
3	laws of this Commonwealth; and
4	(viii) arrest any person who damages, mutilates or
5	destroys the property of the member institution or
6	commits any other offense, including threats or acts of
7	terrorism, on the grounds and in the buildings of the
8	member institution and carry that person before the
9	proper district justice and prefer charges against that
10	person under the laws of this Commonwealth.
11	(2) Except when acting under 42 Pa.C.S. Ch. 89 Subch. D,
12	campus police shall exercise these powers and perform these
13	duties only on the grounds of the member institution.
14	(3) For the purposes of applying the provisions of 42
15	Pa.C.S. Ch. 89 Subch. D under this subsection, the grounds of
16	the institution shall constitute the primary jurisdiction of
17	the campus police.
18	(b) Cooperative agreementsA member institution is
19	authorized to enter into an agreement with the municipalities
20	overlain by or abutting its campus to exercise concurrently
21	those powers and to perform those duties conferred pursuant to a
22	cooperative police service agreement in accordance with 42
23	Pa.C.S. § 8953 (relating to Statewide municipal police
24	jurisdiction). Campus police under this subsection shall have
25	the same powers, immunities and benefits granted to police
26	officers in 42 Pa.C.S. Ch. 89 Subch. D. Agreements under this
27	subsection shall be consistent with the mission and purpose of
28	the system.
29	(c) Rights of campus policeWhen acting within the scope
30	of the authority of this section, campus police are employees of

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1	the member institution and shall be entitled to the same rights.
2	Section 2012-A.1. Articulation agreements.
3	Money appropriated for program initiatives, including
4	performance measurement and system-wide technology initiatives,
5	shall be contingent upon the system making all articulation
6	agreements with other higher education institutions available on
7	the member institution's publicly accessible Internet website.
8	Section 2013-A.1. State System of Higher Education Performance-
9	Based Incentive.
10	(a) AwardThe State System of Higher Education
11	Performance-Based Incentive shall be awarded to member
12	institutions using performance-based metrics adopted by the
13	board. The performance-based metrics must include graduation
14	rates, retention rates, postgraduation education rates, degree
15	production, affordability, postgraduation employment and
16	salaries, including wage thresholds that reflect the added value
17	of a baccalaureate degree, access and other metrics approved by
18	the board in a formally noticed meeting. The board shall adopt
19	benchmarks to evaluate each member institution's performance on
20	the metrics to measure the member institution's achievement of
21	institutional excellence or need for improvement and minimum
22	requirements for eligibility to receive performance funding.
23	(b) AmountEach fiscal year, the amount of money available
24	for allocation to the member institutions based on the
25	performance-based funding model shall consist of the State's
26	investment in performance funding, plus institutional
27	investments consisting of money deducted from the base funding
28	of each member institution of the system in an amount provided
29	in the general appropriation act. The board shall establish
30	minimum performance funding eligibility thresholds for the
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1	State's investment and the institutional investments. A member
2	institution that meets the minimum institutional investment
3	eligibility threshold, but fails to meet the minimum State
4	investment eligibility threshold, shall have its institutional
5	investment restored but is ineligible for a share of the State's
6	investment in performance funding. The institutional investment
7	shall be restored for each member institution eligible for the
8	State's investment under the performance-based funding model.
9	(c) Failure to meet thresholdThe following apply:
10	(1) A member institution that fails to meet the board's
11	minimum institutional investment performance funding
12	eligibility threshold shall have the institutional investment
13	withheld by the board and must submit an improvement plan to
14	the board that specifies the activities and strategies for
15	improving the member institution's performance. The board
16	must review and approve the improvement plan and, if the plan
17	is approved, monitor the member institution's progress in
18	implementing the activities and strategies specified in the
19	improvement plan. The member institution shall submit
20	monitoring reports to the board by December 31 and May 31 of
21	each year in which an improvement plan is in place. The
22	ability of a member institution to submit an improvement plan
23	to the board is limited to one fiscal year.
24	(2) The system shall withhold disbursement of the
25	institutional investment until the monitoring report is
26	approved by the board. A member institution determined by the
27	board to be making satisfactory progress on implementing the
28	improvement plan shall receive no more than one-half of the
29	withheld institutional investment in January and the balance
30	of the withheld institutional investment in June. A member

1	<u>institution that fails to make satisfactory progress may not</u>
2	have its full institutional investment restored. Any
3	institutional investment money that is not restored shall be
4	redistributed in accordance with the board's performance-
5	based metrics.
6	(d) DistributionDistributions of performance funding
7	under this section shall be made to each of the member
8	institutions listed in the general appropriation act.
9	(e) ReportBy October 1 of each year, the board shall
10	submit to the Governor, the President pro tempore of the Senate,
11	the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the chairperson and
12	minority chairperson of the Appropriations Committee of the
13	Senate, the chairperson and minority chairperson of the
14	Appropriations Committee of the House of Representatives, the
15	chairperson and minority chairperson of the Education Committee
16	of the Senate and the chairperson and minority chairperson of
17	the Education Committee of the House of Representatives a report
18	on the previous fiscal year's performance appropriation, which
19	must reflect the rankings and award distributions.
20	(f) RegulationsThe board shall adopt regulations to
21	administer this section.
22	Section 2014-A.1. Regulatory authority.
23	(a) AuthorityThe State board has the authority to
24	regulate the system and shall adopt a regulation development
25	procedure for the trustees to use in implementing duties and
26	responsibilities under this article.
27	(b) RegulationsThe board shall adopt regulations if
28	expressly authorized or required by law. Regulations must be
29	adopted pursuant to a development procedure that complies with
30	subsection (c). If the board delegates a power or duty to a
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1	trustee as the designee, the authority to adopt rules or
2	regulations is included in the delegation. If the board
3	delegates a statutory power or duty to a trustee, the trustee
4	shall be subject to the provisions to the same extent as the
5	board under this subsection.
6	(c) Development procedure The following apply:
7	(1) The development procedure for regulations authorized
8	or required by law must provide for:
9	(i) notice to the public of, and an opportunity for
10	public comment on, the proposed adoption, amendment or
11	repeal of a regulation;
12	(ii) a process for a substantially affected person to
13	challenge a statement of general applicability that has
14	not been properly adopted as a regulation;
15	(iii) a process for a substantially affected person
16	to challenge an unlawful regulation; and
17	(iv) a process for the adoption of and challenges to
18	emergency regulations that are necessary to protect the
19	public interest in the emergency.
20	(2) Judicial review shall be sought in the appellate
21	district in which the headquarters of the board is located or
22	in which the main campus of the member institution is
23	located, as applicable. The regulation development procedure
24	shall be published prominently on the publicly accessible
25	Internet websites of the board and the member institutions.
26	Section 2015-A.1. Prohibition.
27	The board is prohibited from assessing any fee on a member
28	institution unless specifically authorized by law.
29	Section 2016-A.1. Authorization to revoke or modify delegate
30	powers.

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1 <u>The board may revoke or modify the scope of any power or duty</u>

2 <u>it has delegated to a designee or trustee.</u>

3 <u>Section 2017-A.1.</u> Continuation of powers and duties.

- 4 All powers, rights, privileges, duties and obligations,
- 5 statutory, contractual or otherwise, of the member institutions

6 or their predecessors and the respective council of trustees of

- 7 the member institutions, heretofore existing and not otherwise
- 8 changed or repealed by this act shall continue in full force and

- 10 Section 3. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
